

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We are now well into the season of Lent. Growing up in a non-liturgical church, I did not experience this ancient tradition of the church until adulthood. When I began to observe the liturgical calendar, I found the traditions of Lent especially appealing. The long season does not solicit sentimentality or emotion in the same way that other holy observances often do. Rather, the season calls for thoughtful consideration of our humanity and a sober assessment of our (un)willingness to sacrifice our comfort for the sake of our beloved. It is a solemn season of reflection and repentance.

This year at Conley's we took part in a new Lenten observance; we produced a devotional book written primarily by members of our own congregation. The endeavor was a rousing success. Sincere thanks are due to those who donated their time and talent to put the book together as well as all who contributed to its contents. All of the essays, testimonies, and artwork were insightful, inspirational, and thought provoking. For me, even the cover was thought provoking; I must admit that I was a little taken aback at first. The title in bold letters: "Shout it Out;" beneath that, a biblical exhortation to "Sing to him a new song, play skillfully, and shout for joy" (Psalm 33:3) – all superimposed over a picture of worshipers with upraised hands. Sing a new song? Shout for joy?? Is this Lent or Pentecost?!

The more I contemplated this unusually-joyous-for-Lent cover, the more I liked it. I often remind people of the importance of Lenten Sundays. The Sundays in Lent are not included in the forty days of penitence, but that does not mean they are not an important part of Lent. To the contrary, they remind us that even in the wilderness experiences of life—perhaps especially in the wilderness experiences—we must not lose sight of the joy of the Resurrection. While this joy will culminate at Easter, we begin to live it now. Is this not the way of the Christian life? We walk through a broken world scarred by sin and struggle, and we look forward to the day that Christ will return to reign in joy and peace. But that does not mean life on this earth is something to be stoically endured as we sadly trudge toward a future glory. As Christians, we experience the steadfast love of our Creator in this earthly life; we rejoice in God's amazing grace right now; we are filled with gratitude to our merciful Savior today.

The joy of Lent is a unique type of joy – distinct from the celebratory joy we often associate with holy days and commemorations. It is the joy of the lost discovering the way out of the darkness. The path ahead may be difficult, but there is joy in the homebound journey. Lent is the joy of the broken being made whole. The path to recovery may be painful, but there is joy in the healing process. Lent is the joy of forgiveness. The path to reconciliation may be humbling, but there is joy in a relationship restored. The joy of Lent is the joy of the sinner knowing that God never leaves us or forsakes us. For forty days we symbolically join Jesus in his wilderness, and there we find the greater truth that Jesus joins us in ours. And that is, indeed, something worth shouting and singing about.

I pray that God is blessing you and all of Conley's Church as we journey together on the Lenten path to Easter.

I am assured that, as God has done in the past, He will do again. Whether the solution is immediate or long term, I am confident He will walk with me every step of the way and "it will be okay."

Father God, Holy and Faithful, strengthen me in focus and obedience in full assurance knowing that you see and care. Forgive me when I fret and worry, forgetting Your love and faithfulness, forgetting You are the God of the ages, my ever present help. When I am agitated with worry, still me, wrap Your arms around me and assure me "It will be okay." Thank You, Father God for what You have done in the past and what You are going to do. I am comforted as I pray in gratitude and joy in my Savior's name, Jesus Christ. Amen

Something new is growing in the Enclave! In case you are curious, an enclave is just a distinct area within a larger territory. It is the affectionate term for the area behind Conley's with a U-shaped asphalt walkway surrounded by trees. If you look closely while you are out walking, there are three crosses hiding in the trees, remnants from the years when Conley's congregation put on a live Nativity that brought hundreds of local people in to see the wonder of Jesus's birth story. Recently, it has been largely unused, except by our furry neighbors,

the groundhogs, and Steve and his dog Aries! This land is beckoning us to come, to cultivate a space that will once again welcome the community and reflect the peace that we freely receive from being in relationship with Jesus.



Building off the momentum captured at the prayer walk (summary in Feb newsletter), the Vision team is partnering with avid gardeners in the congregation to plant a colorful peace garden in front of the Enclave. We plan to add a couple benches and maybe some birdhouses too. It will be a symbol of our shared vision. One team member sketched out the initial idea and called it a "spark that will light the fuse of imagination and ideas" to extend our sanctuary beyond the church building. We met on Sunday to rough out a couple ideas in the grass to guide the work. If you squint you can see some twine in the shape of a cross below. We will be clearing a few beds in the com-

ing weeks as well as germinating seeds for planting as soon as the earth warms up. We welcome anyone who likes to garden to help us stoke this little flame into life. Stay tuned for announcements on how you can help.



Soup Social has been hosting between 35 and 50 people for lunch and fellowship since the beginning of the year. Dale Kehrer heads up the teams of people who prepare and serve the lunch. Feeding the Flock (s)



Solitary religion is not to be found . . . The gospel of Christ knows of no religion but social religion; no holiness but social holiness. Faith working by love is the length and breadth and depth and height of Christian perfection.

(From John Wesley's intro to "Hymns and Sacred Poems.") God has blessed this ministry with a growing number of people receiving our bag lunches on Mondays. We have restructured the way we distribute the lunches. Instead of remaining at one location and expecting people to come to us; we now go to the Old Landing Apartments from 11 to 11:30, Millsboro Village 1 & 2 from 11:30 to 12, and the Hickman Motel from 12 to 12:30. In just a few short weeks, we have begun to develop relationships with more people. As Pastor Bill has mentioned, there is an epidemic of loneliness in the world. We see that in the number of people who want a hug or who just hang out to talk for a few minutes. I confess that on occasions, we find it difficult to leave. Reflecting on how we started out 3 years ago, giving out 25 lunches twice a week, it's difficult to wrap my head around giving out 120 to 150 lunches and all the other meals. I'm glad I answered the call to serve.

We are planning to start up the Friday lunch distribution sometime in March. We are in need of two more volunteers who can help Judy and Charlie Parson with assembling the lunch bags and with distribution. This is four hours each Friday, 9AM – 1PM.

Feeding the Flock is made up of an amazing group of volunteers. Join us! The Siesta 2 motel on Long Neck also gets 15-20 meals per week. There are a number of families living there.

Higher Ground Outreach relies on us for helping with about 60 meals per week; and we are helping to provide food for meals at the Douglas Street encampment and the Ace Peer Resource Center in Georgetown. Our church food pantry has also been busy. There are several "regulars" who come each month and we have others who come by sporadically. This ministry is kept thriving by the generous donations from you, our faith family; donations from Panera Bread, Wawa markets, the Historic Lewes Farmers Market (April to December) and most recently by food from the Food Bank of Delaware.





In church, we use the words "mercy" and "grace" frequently but are we aware of how those terms are different from one another? Let me illustrate with a story.

One day a son directly disobeyed his father. The boy looked his father in the eye and defiantly declared, "I'm not going to do what you are asking me to do."

The father's heart was filled with a mixture of anger and confusion. He knew he needed to discipline his son, but when he entered the boy's room, he found tears in his son's

eyes. The child begged for mercy, not wanting to receive the punishment he knew he deserved.

Moved by his son's tears, the father embraced him. He chose not to give the boy the punishment he deserved – that is mercy. But the father didn't stop there, he decided to extend grace as well.

The father reached into his pocket and pulled out some money. He told his son, "Let's go out for some ice cream." The boy's eyes widened in surprise. He hadn't expected this additional kindness. That ice cream was grace – receiving something he didn't deserve.

In the same way, God's mercy is withholding the judgment we sinners deserve. When Jesus took the punishment for our sins upon himself, we didn't get what we deserved. That is mercy. But God's grace goes beyond mercy. He continually gives us what we don't deserve – blessings on earth and eternal life in heaven. Grace is God giving us what we do not deserve.

Mercy is not getting the punishment we deserve. Grace is receiving that which we don't deserve. Both flow from God's love and compassion.

There are three aspects to grace: prevenient, justifying, sanctifying.

Prevenient grace means that God comes to us before we make any move toward God. When a mother-to-be is pregnant, she loves the baby she is carrying. She doesn't know anything about the child. Will the baby be easy to get along with or more difficult? She doesn't know or really care – she loves her future child just because it is. The baby hasn't done anything to earn or deserve that love – it is just loved because it is. That is how God loves us. We are loved by God just because we are.

Then there is justifying grace. Once we grow up a bit, we learn the difference between right and wrong. And we don't always do what is right. We try to be good, but we fall short of the goodness that is expected of us. So, we accept Jesus into our lives and the perfect life that Christ lived becomes a part of us. Once we accept Christ into our lives, when God looks at us, he doesn't see our sin and wrongdoings but, instead, Christ's perfection. Justifying grace is "just as if" I'd never sinned.

But there is a third aspect to grace. "Cheap" grace is saying, I'll just go ahead and sin and let God forgive and forgive me, Sanctifying grace is us saying, "God has forgiven my sins, so in response I am going to try my hardest to live a life pleasing to him." We are sinners saved by grace, so when we fail to live as we should, we ask forgiveness and try again.

<u>The Journey</u>

One thousand nine hundred and ninety-six years ago on Palm Sunday, Jesus began His final journey into the city of Jerusalem. His followers laid palms on the road as He came into the city on a donkey. His destination was the fulfillment of God's plan of redemption for mankind. He came to fulfill the scriptures that were proclaimed by the prophets of the Old Testament...Salvation was lost without a sinless sacrifice, so God gave up his only son to return his creation to his loving arms. Jesus knew what laid ahead for him. Did He agonize over God's plan for him? Yes, by shedding tears of blood in the garden on the night He was betrayed. But, because of His great love for us, He continued on the journey his Father had laid before him. We have a journey too. Ours is so small in comparison to Jesus. All we have to do is believe! Believe He died for our sin, paid the price of our redemption, rose from the dead, and reunited us with God, our Father. The greatest and most precious gift we could ever receive. Can we ever fully understand it? No, we can't, that's why its called faith. Don't let another Easter of resurrection pass by without thanking Jesus for dying in your place. Ask Him into your heart and your life. We know not what day or hour we may be called upon to appear before Him. We are one breath away from eternity, accept this gift today.


We are kindling a fire. In this cold world full of hatred and selfishness, our little blaze may seem to be unavailing, but we must keep our fire burning.

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



'Contemplative' absorption into some of the world's most famous paintings can render us into another world, and deeply spiritual at-oned with it. God loves art, after all he created this awesome, wonderous, entire corporeal world and our five senses! And so, such is **this** painting by Russian artist excellance' lvan Kramskoy. I actually stumbled upon this in my internet wanderings of all things, **'Lenten'** (*to length-en*), **"40 day"- ish!**

<u>From a commentator:</u> Kramskoy's final stop was the Crimean peninsula in the southwest of the Russian Empire. It was the closest thing he could get to the climate of Palestine. He walked the terrain from sunrise to sunset, trying to decode the feelings of someone who was left one-on-one with his reveries in a rocky, bare and mountainous desert." ... " Kramskoy explores also his own ecstatic understanding of the painting,

reading into the painting and offering his own explanation even as he asks for one:

And now, I give you over to the artists' own pondering:

"The features that you gave to your creation, in my opinion, do not at all serve to excite pity for the "sufferer"...No, they immediately amazed me as an expression of enormous moral strength, a hatred of evil and a complete determination to fight it.

He (Jesus) is absorbed with what the actions that he must undertake, he searches in his head all that he will say to the despicable and unfortunate people, those whom he had left when he went to the desert to think in freedom."

"Suffering does not concern him now: it is so small, so insignificant in comparison with what is now in his

chest, that the thought of it doesn't come to Jesus' head.... For each person who, however imperfect, was still created in the image and likeness of God, there comes a moment in life when he falls into contemplation: should he go to the right or to the left? Should he 'take a rouble' in exchange for the Lord God or not to yield a single step to evil?" "Towards the morning, weary, exhausted, suffering, he sits alone among the stones, the sad, cold stones; His hands are convulsively and tightly clenched, legs injured, head bowed down ...He is thinking hard, He has been silent for a long time, for such a long time that His lips are baked, His eyes no longer notice objects ...He feels nothing, neither that it's a bit cold, nor that He has become all stiff from long and motionless sitting.

And around Him, nowhere and nothing quivers even slightly, only the black clouds swim from the east on the horison... And he is still thinking, thinking, it all becomes frightening...

How many times have I cried before this figure !?"
