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

With the start of a new year bearing down on us, I was reading about New Year's Day traditions around the world. In Rome, there is a tradition of throwing things out. Literally. Throwing things out the window. The saying, "Out with the old, and in with the new" is dramatically illustrated. A safety tip for travelers: if you are ever in Rome on New Year's Day, stay alert to falling objects. In Chile, some families usher in the new year in the company of deceased loved ones by sleeping in the cemetery. A village in Peru features a New Year's Eve festival where neighbors, co-workers, and even family members engage in fist fights with one another to settle their differences. This makes them "even" as they begin a new year.

There are many unique rituals used to observe the arrival of a new year in communities around the world, but my favorite comes from a city in Mexico. Leading up to midnight, the central square is filled with throngs of people, bands, and vendors who sell--in addition to the typical souvenirs and food--cheap clay plates. Each plate represents a regret. As the bell of the great cathedral on the square tolls in the new year, the people smash their plates by throwing them full force against the wall of the cathedral. Old grudges, old fears, old resentments, old prejudices, old sins . . . cast them off! Smash them to bits against the wall of faith and be done with them.

As you know, the Christian New Year began with the First Sunday of Advent. I like that as people of faith we begin our new year with a sense of excitement and anticipation, looking forward to the coming of Jesus. I also like that the world's New Year always falls somewhere around Epiphany. Epiphany emphasizes revelation and discovery; fresh perspectives and renewed visions. What a great theme for the start of 2024! What does God have in store for us in the days to come?

You've heard the expression, "Today is the first day of the rest of your life." It calls us to face the future with hope and determination. It is the attitude that Paul models for us in the passage above, and to which all people of faith are called. We are able to face the future unafraid and full of hope because we know the power of Christ's resurrection and the fellowship of his suffering. May we at Conley's strain toward what is ahead in the assurance of Emmanuel - God is with us.



Why is Prayer Important?

Season of Waiting

The Christian life is one of seasons of waiting. Christmas is over. The Advent wait to celebrate Christ's birth is over. We enter another season of waiting; waiting to celebrate his resurrection when he went to heaven to prepare a place for us. On Easter we rejoice in his resurrection and begin the wait in hope for the time to come when he returns to take us to be with him. We follow the yearly calendar and the cycle of waiting begins again. We are reminded that God also waits. He waits for people to see His glory, to admit they are lost without Him, to say yes to His love. He waits, "not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance." (2 Peter 3:9). 
to do what Jesus did; to pray, to worship, to love, to serve, to feed, to clothe, to teach, to care and to wait in hope in God's time.

Then we begin the wait in hope of Your return. The year goes on and the cycle of waiting begins again. We are called to wait in hope. We become impatient and sometimes question Your plan – Your timing. Forgive us our impatience and weak faith. You in Your almighty wisdom knew we would be weak and impatient so You sent Your Holy Spirit to abide with us and guide us and strengthen us. While we wait, Father God, strengthen and guide us by Your Holy Spirit to do what Jesus did. Lead us to pray, to worship, to love, to serve, to feed, to clothe, to teach, to care and to wait in hope, in Your time. In everything we give thanks and glory and honor to You, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

Above all sing spiritually. Have an eye to God in every word you sing. Aim at pleasing him more than yourself, or any other creature. In order to do this attend strictly to the sense of what you sing, and see that your heart is not carried away with the sound, but offered to God continually; so shall your singing be such as the Lord will approve here, and reward you when he comes in the clouds of heaven.

Congregational Prayer Walk Sunday, January 14th Following the Worship Service Lunch Provided

The following is an excerpt from "A God Corrected Vision", an article by Melvin Amerson of the Lewis Center for Church Leadership at Wesley Theological Seminary:

"Where there is no vision, the people will perish," Proverbs reminds us. Vision is one of the five human senses, but is also one of the guiding forces in the lives of believers and congregations. Often, when vision is limited or impaired, individuals or churches limit themselves to familiar areas and practices.

Loss of focus or visual acuity can cause challenges. For individuals, vision challenges can often be corrected or improved by prescriptive eyewear or surgery. In the church, limited vision can adversely influence ministry, programming, growth, and financial resources. With congregations, it is usually more difficult to detect loss of vision. Unfortunately, fear and complacency are two of the major causes of poor vision in congregations. Is it not ironic that both individuals and congregations periodically need to have their vision checked?

Over a period of time, we all need new God Corrected Vision. Churches with little vision tend to struggle to maintain viable ministry. Corrected vision provides congregations with a new lease on ministry. God will correct or re-focus our vision if we seek and discern God's will for us. With new vision comes discovery of new mission fields and ministry opportunities.

It is true that where there is no vision, the people perish. It is also true that where there is a Godly vision, the people flourish.

Conley's Vision Team enthusiastically agrees that "God will correct or re-focus our vision if we seek and discern God's will for us." Therefore, we have been earnestly seeking God's will and want our church family to join us in this. We have planned a church-wide prayer walk to follow our worship service on Sunday, January 14th. Members of the Vision Team will lead all who choose to participate to pray at the "four corners" of our church; options to pray indoors or outdoors will be provided. Handouts will be made available so that those who cannot attend may still participate when they are able; the handouts will also encourage everyone to continue in prayer for God's guidance (prayer is not a one-time event!). At the conclusion of the prayer walk, we will provide lunch and encourage everyone to talk about any inspirations they may have.

In the meantime, we request that you pray for the Vision Team, and we encourage everyone to make prayer for God-given vision for Conley's a regular part of your prayer life. We have found it helpful to pray that God will inspire us in three general areas: ways to use our **physical** facilities/land to further our ministries, ways to build **relational** connections within our church family and with our community, and ways to nurture **spiritual** health and growth for all.

Living Out Our Faith In 2024 (by Jerry Pawlikowski)

I picked up something along the way concerning the ways of faith. A former Pastor of mine, Pastor Walt Edmonds at Damascus MD UMC, told me something many years ago that has stuck with me. What he said was this - if we aren't moving forward in our faith journey we are moving backward. Evidently, as far as God is concerned, there is no neutral gear or park, only drive or reverse. But we can and often do slip up, fall back a bit, in our Christian walk...don't we?

Let's look at some of the things that I believe it takes to live out our faith and keep moving forward in our faith journey.



A recent on-line article by Jordan Sears titled "5 Easy Ways to Live Your Faith" (at https://www.dayspring.com/articles/5-easy-ways-to-live-your-faith) has some good suggestions including:

- 1) Be a friend.
- 2) Use your gifts.
- 3) Radiate positivity.
- 4) Show your gratitude.
- 5) Do your best.

Looking at this deeper, I raise four issues that together, can give us HOPE in living out our faith. That is hope, as in H...O...P...E:

H is for Humility.

A humble heart, a focus on others not ourselves. Remember how Jesus humbled himself at his birth at a stable and on the cross at his death. Christ modeled servanthood throughout his life. He humbled himself by washing the feet of His 12 disciples before the Last Supper. But he also challenged us when he told us in John (13:14-15): "So you also should wash each other's feet. I did this as an example for you. So you should do for each other like I did for you."

O is for being Open.

For this new year we should be open to new possibilities. Opening ourselves up to new or different ways of living out our faith. As written in Mark 9:23: "All things are possible to him who has faith."

P is for Prayer.

Prayer and faith are intertwined. As written in Matthew (21:22): "And all things, whatever you make request for in prayer, having faith, you will get."

Be in prayer and meditation. Watch for God's response. Read God's word. Paul says in Romans 10:17 – "So faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God."

And E is for Embrace.

God calls us to embrace, that is, to fully accept and hold onto our faith. To embrace Christ as our light in this fallen world.

As Christ said in John (12:46): "I have come as a light into the world, so that no one who has faith in me will go on living in the dark". And then in John (14:1): "Let not your heart be troubled: have faith in God and have faith in me."

And as Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 5:17: "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation:: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"


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Evangelism Team News

Looking back over the past year I am amazed to think that we have served about 15,000 meals and our outreach continues to expand. We have made new friends and have been able to help some of our clients with clothes and other things from the Thrift Store. A number of our families were on the Angel Tree this year and we were able to welcome



one of the women, to our UWF Christmas Tea.

We received the year end report from the Historic Lewes Farmer's Market which supplied us with fresh produce, dairy and meat from April through December. It certainly was a huge help to us in controlling cost of meals. We received an astonishing \$15,544.25 in product. At this point we have been notified that we will be part of the grant program in



Two of our grandchildren, Hannah (age 11) and David (age 7), were over at our house. I was playing, and singing with, music on Alexa: "New York City" by John Lennon and "Big Apple Dreamin" by Alice Cooper. This led to a conversation about NYC. Hannah wanted to see the Statue of Liberty, while David wanted to ride the subway. So, I said, 'Why don't we go to New York City?" And we found a day to do so. During the Christmas season.

Marie and I awoke early, at 5:00 A.M. We proceeded to drive to our daughter Valarie's home on Thompsonville Road in Milford. Six of us took off to NYC: Valarie, her husband Steven, and the two grandchildren.

Valarie drove us to Hamilton, New Jersey where we enjoyed a hearty breakfast at Cracker Barrel. At Hamilton station we boarded a train into NYC. After a 90-minute ride, we arrived at Penn Station and immediately took a subway to the Staten Island ferry. David's favorite part of the trip was the subway rides. During the ferry ride we had spectacular views of the Statue of Liberty, as well as Ellis Island. At Ellis Island my grandparents came to America from the Netherlands after the devastation of World War II.

At Ellis Island my grandmother was given an extremely painful smallpox vaccination. Unable to understand much English, she was moved along the intake line and asked if she received her smallpox vaccination. All she heard was "smallpox vaccination" and she cried out "No No No!" The officials therefore thought that she didn't get the inoculation and a second painful shot was administered. It happened several times and her arm was scarred and had ugly holes at the injection site for the rest of her life. I saw her scarred arm many times.

We ate lunch in Staten Island and then headed back to Manhattan. I was quite moved by the Statue of Liberty and spent much of the time on the ferry with my hand over my heart thanking God for the life he had given me. It was Hannah and David's first time seeing the statue and they were in awe. We also had a prolonged view of One World Trade Center, the rebuilding that took place on the site of 9/11. It is now America's tallest building.

Back in Manhattan, we took the subway to 42nd Street. We walked through Times Square overwhelmed by it all and saw the location of the New Year's ball drop. Rockefeller Plaza was next. We watched the ice skaters and saw the beautiful lighted Christmas tree. Also, we couldn't miss the FAO Schwartz toy store. During the entire day we encountered street performers, as well as the homeless.

It was time to head home, so we took a subway to Penn Station where we found the train that would take us back to Hamilton. The train station was packed with tourists. We arrived back in Delaware at 11:00 P.M. It was a full and blessed day in New York City.

January? In a hurry to *move-on* from the Christmas Story? **Not so fast**. Verily - behold the miracles underfoot of that 'special' day, in yet other ways.

Epiphany Reflections

Epiphany

Many of us were introduced to Epiphany through the familiar silhouetted-image of Three Wise Men bearing gifts as they followed the Great Star by night. In some cultures, Epiphany is known as the *Day of the Kings (Dia de los Reyes)*. It is also known as Twelfth Day or Twelfth Night, reflecting an old custom of giving a gift for each of the days from December 25 to January 6 for the 12 days of Christmas. The day has special meaning for a number of reasons. Several branches of Christianity celebrate the birth of the Christ Child on January 6 or January 7. The word *epiphany* means *appearance* or *manifestation*. Popular usage likens *epiphany* to words such as *eureka* or *aha!* Use of this word by some English speakers conjures images of having a light bulb turned on, or of being able to see something that was once hidden from view. The texts for the Sundays after the Epiphany dramatize the many ways that we people came to understand who Jesus was, through his baptism, the miracle at the wedding, or through that bodacious declaration in his hometown synagogue! But, this ever-widening circle of revelation began 'outside the circle' of Judaism, so to speak, with the Magi.

Who were the Magi?

Many versions of the Bible refer to them as the *Wise Men*. We often forget that these Magi or Wise Men were non-Jews. Older sources suggest that they were priestly descendants of one of the tribes of the Medes known for their knowledge of the stars (astronomy) and their ability to interpret dreams. *What can we learn from the Wise Men?*

First, the Wise Men began their journey because of their beliefs.

It was a common belief that when a world leader like a king was born that a special stellar phenomenon would appear in the sky. The Magi saw something that convinced them that they had seen the long-awaited sign. Historians tell us that the Jews, the Romans, and the Persians were all watching the skies about that time, looking for signs of the birth of an extraordinary king. A few years before, around 11 BC, Halley's Comet had been seen. There were other stellar phenomena, including a bright star, Sirius, which appeared brightly in the daytime instead of at night. The Wise Men saw the star and began their journey.

May God give us all inspiration for this year's journey.

Second, the Wise Men were willing to follow what they had seen into unknown territory.

Their journey took them outside their country and their comfort zone. The Wise Men risked the consequences of disobeying Herod, who was known to behave as a madman when provoked and returned to their country by another way.

The Christian journey is often an off-road excursion.

Third, the Wise Men were committed to the journey—wherever the star might lead.

The Wise Men set out to find a newborn King by following a star and ended up in finding a baby born to young, relatively poor parents! Not exactly what they expected and not exactly what befit their dignity as priests. In this coming year, may we look to heaven for guidance and comfort and may we accept God's blessings in whatever forms we find them, just as the Wise Men accepted that their long, expensive journey led them to a baby born to young, inexperienced parents who lived on the poor side of town.

Finally, the Wise Men brought gifts.

They did the thing that people in the East or in Africa or in India would do when visiting royalty. They brought gifts.

Gold was the kind of gift that you brought to a king Frankincense was the kind of gift that you would bring to a priest. Myrrh was given to someone who was about to die.

On This Twelfth Day, or Three Kings Day, otherwise known as Epiphany, think of the gift that you will offer to God in the coming year. The gift of time? The gift of your talents? Your service in the community? Your witness and testimony? The gift of undying love and devotion?

Their greatest gift comes to us in the form of a realization. The Wise Men were the first Gentiles to recognize that Jesus belongs to everyone. Good news is for everyone, not just a select few.

Star of wonder, Star of light, Star with royal beauty bright, Westward leading, Still Proceeding, Guide us to thy perfect light. Amen.

And please provide a relevant Bible verse and a brief closing prayer.
