




Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord from the heavens; praise him from the highest heights. Praise him, all his angels; praise him, all his heavenly hosts. Praise him, sun and moon; praise him, all you shining stars. Praise him, you highest heavens, and you waters above the clouds. ~ Psalm 148:1-4

Sometimes when reading Scripture a particular verse jumps out at me. It may be a verse I never noticed before, or it may be a familiar verse that strikes me in a new way. Such was the case recently as I read Psalm 148, our lectionary Psalm for Sunday, May 18th. The phrase "shining stars" in verse three struck me as having a duel meaning. The psalmist is referring to the stars in the sky, but I read the words as referring to our faith community here at Conley's. I was reminded of Paul's encouragement to "shine like stars in the universe as you hold out the word of life" (Philippians 2:15-16), and the way the members of our church are a blessing to one another and to our community.

Perhaps my favorite story from Jesus' post-Easter time on earth is his encounter on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35). Cleopas and his companion--most likely his wife despite typically being depicted in art as a man--were clinging to hope. Jesus had been murdered, and rumors of his resurrection inspired more confusion than encouragement. What happened? What was going on? What would come next? Then a stranger, a fellow traveler on the road, engaged them in conversation. His words helped them to make sense of it all as gently, step by step, he walked beside them in the truth. When they invited the stranger into their home, he broke bread with them, and "*then their eyes were opened*." The phrase recalls the story in Genesis 3 where the eyes of Adam and Eve were opened. But where the eyes of Adam and Eve were opened to sin and shame, the eyes of Cleopas and his companion were opened to grace and glory. And they began to shine. They reflected the glory of the one sitting at their table. And, when Jesus disappeared from their sight, they continued to shine, rushing back into the night to bear witness to the Resurrection.

Since then, Christians have walked the same road. Confused and conflicted. Fighting fears and frustrations. Plagued by discouragement and doubt. We worry and fret about many things. But like those first disciples, we have a hope. We know Jesus' Resurrection has defeated death and we are not left to journey through life alone. The King of kings and Lord of the universe is our friend and companion all the way. We are Easter people. And, like those first disciples, as we walk in Jesus' resurrected presence, we reflectively shine his light. So praise him, all you shining stars. Christ is risen; he is risen indeed. Hallelujah!



I recently began reading and using the book, "Earth Gospel – A Guide to Prayer for God's Creation"; as part of my prayer time. In the introduction, the author, Sam Hamilton-Poore, talks about the connection between loving God and loving God's creation and how many Christians don't feel that is our job to care for "this world". The biblical texts, prayers and readings in the book call us to embrace and care for God's creation because of our relationship with the Spirit of God in Jesus Christ. Hamilton-Poore says that the creation is suffering a crisis through pollution, erosion, and extinction of species due to habitat destruction.

Conley's Campus and Prayer Garden are places where we can begin to demonstrate our love and caring for a small part of God's magnificent creation.

Join us on May 1 at 3:30 for a time of planting and praying. Signs will be at strategic locations around the campus, each focusing on a specific aspect of our church life. A map will be provided for you to use as you pray around the church property and prayer garden.

A healing service is planned for June 5th.



Soup Kitchen

Soup for the Soul has continued to serve about 30 people per week. Many are people who have been coming to the Wednesday gathering for a number of years and enjoy the social aspects

of sharing a meal. There are some new faces scattered among them and the people from KSI are always a welcome edition.

Feeding the Flock

We are so excited to, once again be receiving produce, meat and dairy from the Historic Lewes Farmer's Market. We know that this will be available through mid-July. After that we are not sure what will happen. As reported in last months' newsletter, funding for the grant program that provided the Farm to Community program will be discontinued in July. They are exploring other options for funding. We also received "Easter" boxes from Mountaire. We were able to distribute 35 boxes to our lunch clients. We are seeing many different needs from these clients aside from food. Although, management prevents us from "openly evangelizing", we find many ways to share our love of Jesus with these people.

Food Pantry

Our pantry is well stocked with most non-perishable items. We do need shelf stable milk, like Parmalat. In the freezers, we have chickens, turkeys, ground beef and some pork products. Sandy sees a steady stream of people needing food help.



Give Mom, the love she needs when she makes a mistake, when she may hurt your feelings. I'm sure you have hurt her feelings many times more than you would care to admit.


God gave you to her for a particular reason. He knew what kind of mother you would need to become His child.

Being the middle child of five siblings, I frequently felt less noticed compared to my brothers and sisters. It's true what they say about the over looked, middle child. The oldest are listened to and used for household tasks because they are the elders. The youngest are watched over and babied. The middle one – overlooked. Growing up, the seven of us (two parents, five children) filled the pew at First Baptist Church in Paterson,

New Jersey. It was a large urban church. I was often restless during the service, as kids were, and my mother would say to me – "Be quiet, listen to him," pointing to the pastor. For overlooked middle-child Jimmy – a light bulb went off - that's who I wanted to be. The one who stood in the pulpit. The one people were expected to listen to. Even in my young mind, I understood prevenient grace. I have attended church since birth. I felt loved and wooed by my family, by the church people, and by God. Later on, I had a sense of justifying grace – I felt that believing in God and in his son Jesus, who died on the cross for us, created a bond of love and forgiveness. But sanctifying grace. I wasn't quite mature enough to allow God to work through me and guide my actions. In the theological sense, things are sanctified when they are used for the purpose God intends.

I have always been drawn to pastoral ministry. My family encouraged that call, the church people encouraged that call, my friends knew me to be a person who should enter the pastoral ministry. And the call was real and genuine – not just a child wanting to be a policeman. My relationship with God was calling me to a life-time of service to Christ's church.
